





A MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT

When I read this issue of *Zippers*, I was very impressed by the contributions. I found all the stories relevant and informative and I hope you do too. The Cardiac Ambassadors story on page 5 particularly caught my attention – it is a great story about how donations to the Heartbeat Epworth Centenary Scholarship Fund are making a difference. Congratulations Jo and Glenice for such an innovative use of scholarship funding in the cardiac rehab area. On behalf of the Committee I would like to acknowledge all the contributors and our editor for pulling together such a great issue of *Zippers*.

A very big thank you to those members who paid their annual Membership Fee prior to the due date of 1 August. There are some members who are yet to pay but there is still a steady flow of renewals coming in by mail and by direct deposit into our bank account. The Membership Fee is very important as it is used to help pay the administrative costs (including printing, postage and insurance) of running the association rather than relying on general fundraising income to meet these costs.

It is very pleasing to see that almost half of all payments by members to Heartbeat are now by Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT). This method of payment provides us with greater traceability of income and reduces work for our Treasurer. We rarely have any problems identifying members payments, however, one member who paid their membership fee by EFT via Bank First on 26 July neglected to reference their name or their membership number. We would like to update this member's records and issue a receipt for their payment but we don't know who they are! INTRODUCING EPWORTH'S NEW CARDIAC REHAB AMBASSADORS

"By far the biggest learning was the enormity of difference cardiac rehab makes to patients," says Terri Irvine, Epworth Richmond cardiac nurse.





Terri is one of four new Cardiac Rehab Ambassadors across Epworth who have participated in a professional development program for acute cardiac nurses to build their knowledge of cardiac rehabilitation. The Ambassador Program was developed by Jo Kevill, Cardiac Rehabilitation Coordinator, who was awarded a 2022 Heartbeat Epworth Centenary Scholarship to introduce this initiative.

Terri admits that what she knew about cardiac rehab was limited before she participated in the Ambassador Program.

"In the weeks leading up to the Program I had cared for patients who presented with a range of cardiac conditions including STEMI, Bypass Surgery and PCI. They were all experiencing a level of upset, anxiety and apprehension. While we aim to address any concerns as best we can on the cardiac ward, I now have a better understanding of how the personalised and detailed education and support provided in cardiac rehab makes an enormous difference to them."

"I spent a week each at our Camberwell and Brighton hospitals to experience cardiac rehab in action. Seeing patients transform through rehabilitation was truly incredible."

"Most cardiac rehab patients come to hospital for a couple of hours a day, once or twice a week over the course of their rehabilitation. I was able to observe the gym and group education sessions they attend – some days I even joined in the exercises alongside them!"

"I also spoke to patients about their experiences in hospital or in rehab. Some of them had never been to a gym in their lives and were genuinely enjoying getting active and regaining the confidence to be able to do things again."

"Prior to experiencing a cardiac event, most patients didn't know much about the heart or causes related to cardiac events. Through the education sessions they had time to learn about all aspects of heart health in great detail, hearing not only from experts but also sharing their lived experiences with other participants."

Terri (pictured below in the gym at Epworth Camberwell) says of the Ambassador Program: "The entire experience honestly blew my mind. As an Ambassador I now have the in-depth knowledge to talk about cardiac rehab. I'll share my learnings with colleagues and will be encouraging my patients to participate!"

THE POWER OF SHARING AND GIVING

I recently watched the Australian documentary "Pumphead" (2020 Ronin Films) about the emotional and psychological effects of major cardiac surgery. It features 8 ex-patients including the film-maker Dr Andrew Pike OAM and explores their experiences following surgery, how to understand them, and how to live with them. Pumphead Syndrome is a colloquial term to describe a myriad of symptoms such as depression, anger, confusion, anxiety, panic attacks, nightmares, disorientation and even cognitive change. It is a topic not often spoken about but a part of some patients' journeys that is not surprising considering the complex diversity of emotional and cognitive changes that often occur post-surgery, simultaneous with physical recovery.

With less significant ailments there is often time to adjust to the changes an illness or diagnosis can bring. Even the most strapping and robust find themselves before, during and after major cardiac surgery reflecting on life's big question - 'who am I' now that I've gone through such a significant life event, seemingly 'fixed' and yet feeling so broken at times?

The most powerful messages I took away from the film were:

- the healing that can be found in meeting with others who have also been through cardiac surgery I've no doubt that members of Heartbeat Epworth can attest to the benefits of cardiac rehab and of sharing their stories with and supporting others who have experienced a cardiac event
- those who were able to transition more successfully were open to finding new ways to give life a sense of meaning and purpose - again I am reminded of Heartbeat and how the wonderful work you do for Epworth cardiac care not only benefits the organisation, cardiac patients generally, and members of your group, but you as well!

So keep talking about and sharing your experiences with others and keep up this meaningful work. It is important. You are important!
