BOARD REPORT

Significant decisions were taken at recent meetings of the Board to cement the future direction of the Hospital and contribute immensely to guaranteeing high standards of care for our patients. After long and careful deliberation, the Board has decided to proceed with Open Heart Surgery and was encouraged to do so by the pressing need within the community, the overwhelming support for the project by a wide section of the medical profession and the firmly held belief that an efficient unit of high standing can be established.

The Board also resolved to proceed with the engagement of full time resident medical staff which is a major innovation for a private hospital.

The establishment of an Epworth Medical Foundation to facilitate development and research projects at Epworth is under consideration. A special committee involving Board Members and experts from the community has been formed to study the feasability of this project.

EPWORTH MEDICAL/SURGICAL GROUPS

Following the adoption of new regulations for the Medical Advisory Council, the Board has formally acknowledged the existence of a number of active medical/surgical groups in the Hospital. The new regulations provide each group to nominate a representative to the Medical Advisory Council, which advises the Board on matters of medical policy. The groups for Orthopaedic Surgery, Plastic Surgery, Gastroenterology, Cardiovascular, and Neurology and Neurosurgery have met recently and it is encouraging to see the amount of interest and the large attendance at these meetings. Each of the groups meets a number of times during the year to consider matters relating to their speciality.

EPWORTH MEDICAL CENTRE

Following the completion of planning, work will commence on these projects as soon as funds become available.


THE FUTURE OF EPWORTH

BOARD PROFILE: CLARRIE ARMSTRONG

Frederick Clarence Armstrong was appointed a member of the Epworth Board of Management in 1975. He is Chairman of the Grounds, Buildings and Services Commitee.

In 1929 Mr. Armstrong started his career as an articled pupil in the architecture profession.

He first became involved in hospital planning in 1940 and in 1950 joined the Hospitals and Charities Commission. He resigned from the Commission in 1977 as Chief Architect.

He is a Fellow of the Royal Australian Institute of Architects and a Fellow of the Royal Institute of British Architects.

Clarrie has been heavily involved with the Methodist Church, both in church building throughout Victoria and as a committee member and as president, on a number of welfare associations. Over several years he has been involved in planning matters at Epworth, including the design of the chapel.

Clarrie and his wife live at Mitcham, and Clarrie has involved himself in local community activities. He holds the positions of - Member and Vice-President of Maroondah Social Health Centre since foundation, Committee Member for the Eastern Suburbs Geriatric Centre, Committee member of Ringwood-Croydon Advisory Service and involvement with the local Ringwood Uniting Church.

He believes that the Christian faith is something to be lived and service plays a great part in this. Rewards for community efforts have been ample, with the friendship and help he has received from all people.

Clarrie is semi-retired and now finds time for some travelling with his wife. They have a keen interest in their five children's careers and the developing stages of their ten grandchildren.
